


Supporting good causes What's For Lunch?

Several Boone County nonprofit groups sell food at the fair to thousands of hungry customers. Have lunch, and sample the variety of great food these folks are preparing for you! Everything is prepared "to-go" and can be eaten in the grandstand while watching the race. Here's our guide to what's on offer and where the profits go:

One of the more famous fundraisers hosted by the fair comes from Boone County Fire Protection District 2. The department bakes and sells their own homemade doughnuts, a popular fair delicacy for the past forty years. Coffee and other beverages are also available. Last year, Fire District 2 sold 8,100 dozen, making for an approximate total of 97,200 doughnuts. To make the selling process run smoother, many of the crewmembers arrive at the fairgrounds to bake the pastries at 2 AM. The stand opens at 6 AM and stays open until around 9 PM. All the while, a crew of workers spends their day preparing and selling their doughnuts to Boone County. In past years, the volunteer fire department has collected over \$20,000 in sales. All of the money that the organization brings in from the doughnut sales goes directly back to the department, funding their equipment purchases, as well as protection-related educational services. By using the money in this way, taxpayers living within the fire district are paying less than expected in order to meet the needs of the department.

Boy Scout Troop #224 hosts an annual fundraiser at the fairgrounds where they sell baked potatoes to the public. The organization typically sells nearly 10,000 stuffed baked potatoes on average. The money that is collected each year at the fair is used to fund various scouting related activities throughout the year, such as their annual summer camp. Another boy scout troop assists in cleaning up trash at the fairgrounds. Cub Scout Pack #141 will be

selling ice cream in order to raise funds as well.

The Cosmopolitan Club of Boone County is well known at the fairgrounds for selling sweet corn on the cob. Last August, the group sold over 20,000 ears of corn. Sales profits are distributed to a multitude of causes throughout the county. The club donates a total of \$6000 in scholarships to the surrounding school districts, two \$1000 scholarships each at Belvidere High School, Belvidere North High School and North Boone High School. The remainder of the club's earnings from this fundraiser is donated to local organizations, such as Belvidere Youth Baseball, the Belvidere YMCA and Belvidere Police Department, among various others. In the last fiscal year, The Cosmopolitan Club contributed \$30,000 in local donations and scholarships.

The **4-H Club** oversees and runs multiple youth-related clubs. The club will be hosting a booth for the Flaming Monkeys robotics team, as well as allowing the youth in Boone County to enter their animals in some of the many livestock activities through a variety of clubs. The clubs affiliated with 4-H help to run the **4-H Food Stand, serving hamburgers, hot dogs and pulled pork sandwiches.** Each team or club that runs the food stand takes the profits that they make to fund their individual clubs. The money goes into club activities such as participation in the annual Hometown Christmas and community service projects. The remainder of the money collected is put into the county 4-H fund, which goes

toward helping to fund the 4-H International Night. At this event, every 4-H affiliated club chooses a country to represent and sets up a booth, decorated to suit the culture of said country. This springtime event allows people to sample food and learn about other countries.

The **Belvidere Lions Club** will be selling **pork chops** throughout the entire week of the fair. The Club is engaged in multiple community service-related programs, such as donating four scholarships per year to local high school seniors, assisting less fortunate families around the holiday season, adopting roads and maintaining the baseball dugouts at Belvidere High School. The money made in pork chop sales goes toward funding these programs throughout the year.

The Merry Milk Maids sell thousands of cones and dishes of ice cream. They use over 500 ten-gallon containers of ice cream each year at the fair. Their earnings go toward funding the North Boone Booster Club, the Capron Food Pantry and Belvidere Salvation Army.

The Granges of Boone County are in charge of running the Boone County Fair itself. There are seven different Granges: Big Thunder, Beaver Valley, Capron, County Line, Flora, Leroy and Prairie - which are all linked to the Pomona Grange. The Prairie Grange runs the concessions, grandstand ticket office, information booth, parking lot shuttle carts and the Sunday pork chop dinner. The other Granges participate in similar activities.

Congressman Adam Kinzinger is a "Health Care Champion"?

That's a Whole Lotta' Hogwash!

Congressman Adam Kinzinger has a political problem: He is under orders from his political contributors and party bosses to vote to keep the cost of healthcare high, particularly prescription drugs. He is also following their orders when he continually votes to repeal the Affordable Care Act.

Kinzinger's campaign received over \$74,000 from 34 drug companies in the last year alone. That number is growing as the election nears.

Last fall, in one of the few public forums Congressman Kinzinger has held in his district, he heard the booing of over 500 people in the room when he said he was for the repeal and replacement of Obamacare. The crowd was otherwise pretty civil to Mr. Kinzinger, but no one rose to his defense

Depending on how the question is phrased, the percentage of Americans supporting Medicare for All is approaching two thirds. In terms of national politics, the Pew Research Center reports that immigration and health care are the leading issues voters want the candidates to discuss.

Kinzinger knows he has a problem. You would think he would soft-pedal it. Instead, he doubleddown and recorded a robo-call just before this year's primary election. He stated that he wanted to "above all" repeal Obamacare. Instead of providing healthcare to Americans, he wanted spend that money to build a 2000+ mile wall on the Mexican border!

Kinzinger's voting record incontrovertible evidence that his constituents' health and life expectancy are not his priority. But there is this tricky thing called an election every two years, and all Congressmen have to occasionally at least pretend they care about the voters in their

And no, it is *not* "fake news" or just an unsupported opinion. The public record is well-documented and we needn't catalog here the dozens of "yes" votes Kinzinger has made to take away important health care rights from his constituents. See for yourself in the Congressional Record.

Branded Prescription Drug Costs Are Out of Control

The United States is currently spending far more per capita than any other nation on health care. Yet, 30 countries are getting better results while spending less. Life expectancy is higher than the United States in 30 other countries. A list of thirty countries as diverse as France, Japan, Chile, Norway, the United Kingdom, Costa Rica and Australia! Canadians live more than three years longer than you will as an American. And yet, Canada spends half as much per person on health care than the United States.

Getting costs under control does not mean "rationing" care. It means paying only a fair price for health care and no more. In fact, Canadians and Germans typically spend longer stays in the hospital than we do.

Big pharmaceutical companies are one of the world's most profitable industries. They are absolutely terrified of a system might treat them like a public utility and regulate the monopoly that many of them have on various medications. But if the big drug companies and their unregulated American prices are such a blessing, why aren't we living at least as long as our peers in countries where drug costs are regulated?

Big Pharma to Adam Kinzinger's Rescue

Recently, flyers been hitting the mailboxes of Boone County and the rest of the 16th Congressional

District. These flyers are from the American Life Sciences and Innovation Council and the Alliance for Patient Access. They congratulate Congressman Adam Kinzinger on being a "Champion of Health Care Innovation" and a "Champion of Medicare Access," respectively. Each group allegedly sent out their brochure separately, but you could be forgiven for thinking they were written by the same author. There are a couple of other, similar groups out there, and don't be surprised if you hear from them, too.

According to these flyers, Kinzinger deserves the award because he voted against several complex Medicare and other health care cost-containment bills. Naturally, the flyers describe the bills in more flattering terms, and imply that Kinzinger is trying to improve access to health care.

In many nations, drug prices are regulated by the government, much like utilities. In the United States, Medicare is forbidden to even negotiate drug prices. This arrangement favors drug company profits and Adam Kinzinger is only too happy to oblige the drug companies in return for political contributions.

If these two groups asked you to support Adam Kinzinger or vote for him, they would be subject to federal election laws. Instead, they ask you to phone the Congressman's Washington office and "thank him" for being a "champion." They are organized as nonprofit "advocacy" groups, so they don't have to register as lobbyists or political action committees. For the same reason, they don't have to tell you who contributes to their cause.

Is it any surprise that both organizations are led by the drug industry?

The American Life Sciences and Innovation Council (ALSIC) is headed up by Steve Knuth, who happens to be the CEO of the Public Affairs Company. This company is a lobbying front for the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers Association. This latter group is headed up by senior executives of Biogen, Johnson & Johnson, and Novartis.

The Alliance for Patient Access (AfPA) is run by Woodbury Associates, a Washington, DC public relations firm. The AfPA is a political action organization that masquerades as a patient advocacy organization. The organization is financed by drug companies including Abbvie, Vertex, Bristol Myers-Squibb and Mallinckrodt. Among other activities, the AfPA lobbies Congress to oppose legislation that encourages use of generic and lower cost drugs. They support consumer advertising for expensive drugs and pay doctors to write prescriptions for their products.

Of course political opinions can and do differ. Our concern here is not differing philosophies, but the deceit on the public. If drug manufacturers want to publicly praise Adam Kinzinger, they are free to do so.

But we will call a foul when Big Pharma sets up shadowy groups that imply some independent, greater organization is bestowing Congressman Kinzinger with meritorious awards. Maybe their clever lawyers have found a way to get around the election statutes, but the leaflets do violate the spirit of campaign disclosure laws. If the drug companies and Adam Kinzinger were taking the high road, why the deception?

We think the voters of the 16th Congressional District deserve to know the truth. While Congressman Kinzinger can try to deny his involvement in the deceit, he is quietly receiving quite a payoff for his votes in support of higher drug prices.

Confuse a few voters here and there, and you've suddenly won an election!

Boone County Fair's Current Stance on Pageant Swim Suit Contest By Sofi Zeman

While the selection of local, temporary royalty – chosen, most commonly, for festive events - originated early on in Europe, the first American pageant was not held until centuries later, in the late 1800s. This pageant was quite unlike what we see today, failing and shut down shortly after due to public protest and serving as a complete opposite to the generally positive attitude that is behind pageantry today. It wasn't until 1921 that the true origin of the modern, American beauty contest was born in Atlantic City. The "Atlantic City's Inter-City Beauty Contest" coined the name "Miss America" for the contestant that won over the judges by the end of the evening. The very first winner of the 1921 beauty contest and Miss America title was Margaret Gorman from Washington D.C. While Gorman's victory is regarded as a chapter of American history today, there were many institutions that refused to put their support behind a beauty contest. But, in time, the country truly began to pay attention to what was going on in the world of pageantry. Directors, scouts and big-time movie executives sought after and brought those that were voted as the most beautiful woman in the nation with them to Hollywood. It became not uncommon to see a beauty queen make it on the big screen. Though it took time for the contest to become widely accepted, the fame of the contest soon grew extensively – testing not only the beauty of a contestant, but the poise, talent, athleticism, intellect and community involvement that comes with them as well.

Well, until now.

In early June, the Miss America contest announced that they will be ending the swim suit portion of their

pageant. While the original concept behind this portion was to display and encourage athleticism and fitness in the contestants, the contest began to feel as if this part of the show was becoming physically demeaning and creating false ideals for women across the country. Miss America claimed that they wanted contestants of all body types to be given the opportunity to compete.

"We will no longer judge our candidates on their outward physical appearance," announced Gretchen Carlson, chairwoman of Miss America board of directors.

While the swim suit portion was still present in the last pageant, the 2019 Miss America selected in September of this year - will not have to strip down and walk out on the stage.

"The swimsuit competition never felt congruent with the goals of the Miss America pageant or any pageant that claimed to want to empower young women. Asking women to parade on a stage in swimsuits so that they can be ogled at and graded with a number is outdated and wholly unnecessary."

Miss America is among the most popular pageants in the nation. When a contest as big as this makes an announcement they're making a major change after almost 100 years in the business, people are going to pay attention to it. In early

July, Miss Plymouth County, Maude Gorman, handed back her crown after a pageant emcee made a joke about the woman's movement on stage.

In alternative to the swim suit portion, the contest will now include a live interaction with the judges, where they ask contestants to discuss their life goals, detailing how they plan to use their talents to contribute to society. It seems that the eradication of swim suits in this pageant has made another stride in the world of female empowerment, showing that a major contest values a woman's intellect over the shape of her body.

Though major contests haven't followed suit quite yet, local pageants have begun to consider removing the portion altogether as well. So, what does this mean for Boone County?

The Boone County Fair is perhaps the most popular annual tradition to be carried out in the area. Among the many attractions that the fair brings to the county and its surrounding communities is the fair queen pageant, which has been around since 1959.



The pageant association in Boone County follows the same guidelines and rules as the Miss Illinois pageant. Because the state pageant has not yet made the move, there will still be a swim suit portion in Boone County for the 2018 pageant. 



Tickets are on sale for only \$10 for the newly created event produced by Next Level Bull Riding and sanctioned by Tuff Hedeman, will be held in conjunction with the Boone County Fair on August 10 and begin at 7:00 pm at the Boone County Fairgrounds.

"Tuff Hedeman Breakout Series is a 15 year bull riding tradition here and each year the fans and the sponsors and the entire Fair gets behind it - it's a family friendly event and a great way to entertain the fair goers who are big bull riding fans and are supporting the community, said Matt Noble.

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

Getting Your Kicks on Route 66

The Mother Road offers amazing sights as it winds through Illinois

Perhaps it is the yearning for yesteryear that endears so many to Route 66.

Who wouldn't want to jump into a classic car and explore the United States, stopping at shiny new service stations to pump gas into your vehicle, or sip a cold drink from the soda shops that dot the roadway? Such sepia-toned wishes of driving the Mother Road in its heyday could prompt many of us to start packing for a trip.

Ford had been mass-producing vehicles for a little more than a decade when Route 66 was commissioned on Nov. 11, 1926. It was one of the original highways within the U.S. Highway System, its 2,448 miles starting in Chicago before arriving on the West Coast in Los Angeles (and later the Santa Monica Pier).

By 1985, Route 66 had been removed from the federal highway system, as the entire road had been replaced by the Interstate Highway System.

But it's still possible to get an idea of what the roadway looked like: Just stop in Lexington to take a trip down "Memory Lane," a 1-mile stretch of the original

1926 alignment of Route 66 pavement. It was turned into an interpretive trail and is open year-round to pedestrians and bicycles. There, people can delight in the restored vintage billboards and signage.

Despite it not being part of the Interstate Highway System, every year thousands still travel Route 66 to explore the communities that make up America's Main

Just a small area of Route 66 in Illinois can net some fun experiences. Take Macoupin County: Stop in Girard for a handmade soda at Doc's Soda Fountain, which opened in 1929 as part of Deck's Drug Store.

Take in the 22-foot-high granite monument in Mount Olive of Mary Harris "Mother" Jones, known for her work as an organizer for the United Mine Workers. And, if you're willing to go off the beaten path, you can find the 34 separate bird tracks an errant turkey left on the wet highway cement in the 1920s (find them south of Nilwood on Donaldson Road).

Any road trip should include visits to the many giant characters that call various Route 66 communities home. The Gemini Giant still towers over Wilmington. He holds a rocket and wears a space helmet — unlike his counterpart, the Lauterbach Man in Springfield, which holds an American flag and wears a stocking cap. Both are 28-foot "Muffler Man" creations from International Fiberglass, which were made as a promotional tool for auto shops.

Of course, the 19-foot fiberglass man holding a hot dog in Atlanta shouldn't be missed either (too bad it's not closer to the giant catsup bottle that served as a water tower in Collinsville). And don't forget to stop in Lincoln to see the 12-foot-tall Abraham Lincoln on a 24-foot-tall covered wagon.

There are too many amazing sights to be seen on the Mother Road to list them all. But we offer a few suggestions for those who hop on the roadway at its starting point near Lake Michigan in Chicago and head southwest as they aim to get their kicks on the portion of Route 66 that travels through Illinois.

Texaco Station, 417 W. Waupansie St. in Dwight

Ambler's Texaco in Dwight is a shining example of the domestic-style gas stations along Route 66 during the mid-20th century.

Built in 1933, the station had wood clapboard siding, an arched roof and residential windows adorned with shutters and flower boxes. Three Texaco gas pumps out front were sheltered by a canopy.

In 2002, it was donated to the village of Dwight, which, with the help of the National Park Service, restored it and turned it into a visitor center.

Route 66 Association Hall of Fame & Museum, 110 W. Howard St. in Pontiac With the world's largest painting of the Route 66 shield on the outside and thousands of artifacts inside, the Route 66 Association Hall of Fame & Museum in Pontiac is a shrine to the starting stretch of the Mother Road.

The current incarnation opened in a former firehouse in 2004 and honors people and places that made significant contributions to the history and character of the



Funks Grove Pure Maple Sirup, 5257 Historic U.S. 66 in Shirley/Funks Grove

Production of Funks Grove Pure Maple Sirup has been a family operation since the mid-1800s on land just off Route 66 between Shirley and Bloomington.

In early spring each year, the maple trees are tapped and the sap is processed into the sweet product that has made this business a favorite stop among Route 66 travelers. Tours of the facility are available.

Atlanta murals, Southwest Arch Street in Atlanta More than 80 painters joined forces in 2003 to help preserve the art of hand-painted advertising murals in Atlanta as part of the LetterRip on Route 66 event.

Five murals were painted, all depicting various scenes from life in downtown Atlanta worked into historical advertisements. The year before, members of the LetterHeads organization painted the J.M. Judy & Sons grocery store advertisement that stretches the full length of one downtown building.

International Route 66 Mother Road Festival, Downtown Springfield

More than 1,000 classic cars and tens of thousands of spectators annually attend the threeday International Route 66 Mother Road Festival in downtown Springfield. This year's is scheduled for Sept. 21-23.

There always has been food, special guests and musical entertainment. But from the Friday night cruise and restoration-parts vendors to the classic restored cars, trucks and motorcycles lining the curbs, it has been the motors that matter.

Sky View Drive-In Theatre, 1500 N. Old Route 66 N in Litchfield

The Sky View Drive-In Theatre in Litchfield is the last operating drive-in on Historic Route 66 in Illinois.

According to its website, the Sky View opened in the spring of 1950 and has been in operation each season since then. The Sky View is a seasonal operation and is usually open Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays from early April until mid-October.


Rabbit Ranch, 1107 Historic Old Route 66 in Staunton

Henry's Rabbit Ranch got its start in Staunton when founder Rich Henry's daughter, Emily, had a pair of rabbits that quickly multiplied.

Since Emily lived in a single-room apartment, her father decided to help her out by establishing the Rabbit Ranch for the rabbits and their offspring. Today, the Rabbit Ranch is home to hundreds of rabbits that visitors can interact with (and VW rabbits, too). The ranch also contains Route 66 memorabilia.



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


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Behind the Scenes of Livestock Showing

Each year, the Boone County Fair attracts hundreds of thousands of people from around the county and beyond. While a majority of these people come out just to see the yearly fair festivities, a large portion is there to partake in sales and showmanship. On an annual basis, hundreds of vendors sell their products to the public over the fair's six-day period. Last year, around 400 vendors made an appearance. While this is a considerable number, it is overshadowed by the amount of animal exhibitors that attend. In past years, over 4,000 animals have been shown and judged each year at the Boone County Fairgrounds.

The livestock game is a competitive one. Farmers from northern regions and abroad bring their animals to be judged at fairs all around that are much like our own. Animal judging is based on a multitude of characteristics, that vary for each animal in question. For every type of animal that is shown, there are designated judges per division, and a superintendent that oversees the showing and auctioning of each animal. Superintendents hire judges, assign booths and run the event overall to ensure that the entire process operates smoothly.

Terry Ellingson and Curt Newport are the superintendents of dairy. Their job is to make the day as fun and friendly as possible for exhibitors, animals and their audience. For dairy, the superintendents enjoy making the pens and booths look a little bit more attractive. They clean up after the animals, plant flowers outside and put up cards so each exhibitor knows where they are supposed to be. Ellingson and Newport also organize placings and communicate with the fair directors to make sure that the winners of each event receive their premiums. Ellingson, who has overseen dairy for six years, commented that while dairy shows have gotten less popular, the efforts of the superintendents and their staff have helped to improve the numbers here. As superintendents, the two took an active role in hiring judges for the dairy shows, one of

which is from Southern Illinois.

Dale Rhode has been the superintendent of beef for over 25 years. This year, he will oversee the showing of over 200 beef entries. His duties include hiring judges, as well as organizing the barns and getting them prepared for the fair. Some of the aspects that beef judging is based on include aesthetic appeal, muscle development, capacity to eat forage, and depth of body.

Chuck Klinefelter is in charge of sheep. For the past 33 years, Klinefelter has hired judges for the two different categories of competition - Junior and Open. Junior showing will be held on Thursday of the fair and the Open showing will take place on Friday and Saturday. A supreme champion sheep is selected based on length of loin, breed conformity and depth of animal, among many other characteristics.


Susan and Arnie Schmidt have been the superintendents of rabbits for about six years, but have been involved in rabbit showing for over 30. Much like the other superintendents, the two take care of paperwork and running the show overall. Susan Schmidt explained that judging is performed by the guidelines of the American Rabbit Breeders Association in order to find the proper standard for "perfection" in a rabbit. All rabbits of the same breed compete against each other. Following, the winner of each respective breed of rabbit competes against each other in order to win the title of "Best in Show." Susan and Arnie will have 75 rabbits of their own in contention. There will be 460 rabbits shown in the open division overall.

Other livestock superintendents include Dan and Karen Tuttle, poultry; Mike and Sharon Charlesworth, swine; Robert and Vicki Donley, alpacas. While the primary focus of these animal showing events is centered on the judging process, the superintendents of Boone County help to provide some insight on the inner workings of livestock showmanship.












For more than 75 years, Peoria's Ag Lab **Impacts Our Lives**

PEORIA — The U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Center for Agricultural Utilization Research, formerly named the Northern Regional Research Laboratory, has been headquartered in Peoria for 78 years.

Wait, the what?

Well, it's best known as The Ag Lab, the federal scientific research operation that is the work home of 80 Ph.D. scientists and 120 support staff. Wrapped in post-9/11 wrought iron security, the building has been a solid, if vaguely mysterious, presence at the corner of Nebraska Avenue and University Street since 1940.

Created under the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, The Ag Lab was one of four regional research centers built. Each center cost about \$1 million each to build, equip and staff.

Then, the United States was emerging from the Depression and World War II was on the horizon. "All across this country there were large stockpiles of excess agricultural commodities," former Ag Lab director Paul Sebesta said in 2015. "The chore was to take those excess commodities and create value-added products out of them to support the rural economy. The four centers were located in Peoria, close to the Great Lakes, in Philadelphia, one was located in New Orleans and one was located out on the West Coast, in the Bay Area. Each still exists and all four were constructed exactly the same.

"They were all in the shape of a 'U,' where they had two science wings. And perpendicular to the two science wings was the administration wing. We received additional money in the 1960s to add a third (science) wing onto our building. So we are the largest of the four regional research centers, both in terms of square footage, in terms of human capital and in terms of budget.'

Why Peoria?

The two commodities the Peoria center was to work on were corn and wheat. The reason was because of the Hiram Walker Distilleries, Peoria was the whiskey capital of the world, so the first research initiatives were to improve fermentation technologies. "It was because of the industry that was here and because of the agriculture commodities that were here and because of its close proximity to the Great Lakes. This was in the heart of agriculture territory," Sebesta said.

The Peoria Ag Lab earned it's first fame from penicillin.

Alexander Fleming had discovered penicillin in Britain. England was fighting the Germans before the United States joined World War II and was being bombed regularly and couldn't build the laboratory to produce the penicillin. Britain contacted the USDA, and USDA knew of Peoria's fermentation technologies. The British knew the value of penicillin and so they brought scientists and the penicillin strain to Peoria. They started doing research.

"The original penicillin strain could not be cultured in large amounts," Sebesta said. "They had to do a worldwide search for penicillin cultures, so Army Air Corps pilots were instructed that anywhere they landed, anywhere in the world on a dirt field, they were to scoop up a sample of dirt and send it to Peoria. And we evaluated all those samples for penicillin trying to find samples of penicillin that would grow rapidly because we knew that we needed huge doses of it, and it was hard to grow in the standard

culture. It was purely by luck that a lady brought in a cantaloupe to the lab and there was a strain on there that could be rapidly cultured. The townspeople knew about the search (for penicillin cultures) and this woman, whose name was lost to history, got a moldy cantaloupe out of a Peoria grocery store.

What did the scientists do with the moldy cantaloupe? That's where scientist Andrew Moyer gets involved. They mutated the strain so it would grow faster and then developed the tanks and the medium onto which it would grow, and that happened to be corn steep liquor from the fermentation production

By June 1944, in times for the D-Day invasion, there was suitable quantities of penicillin to support the Normandy Invasion.

The Ag Lab touches the world in countless ways; Huggies diapers and Depends garments, for instance. The super-absorbent starch material that is in those diapers and those types of products that absorb liquid were developed in Peoria. It's also used in operating rooms, anywhere you need to soak up large amounts of fluid because it can soak up to 1,000 times its weight in moisture.




